Greg FRAWLEY (b.1947)

In the lead up and during the 2017 Camden Art Prize, Greg Frawley's' paintings will be on display in the Camden Library and Camden Civic Centre show two main directions - local streetscapes and semi-abstract paintings of torsos in a variety of settings. This latter direction has formed the bulk of my painting over the past 40 years. The streetscapes describe themselves - but the torsos might need some explaining.

Improvising is a great characteristic of Australians living in remote areas.

Having grown up in country towns my mum and dad were great improvisers in making the most of simple living in simple town life. Very content. Few luxuries, just the basics.

Apricots and peaches were the great treasures of summer. I might see only a few each year but they were highly valued and deeply enjoyed. Mangoes and avocados were much later exotic arrivals, lemons and mandarins the stalwarts.

Essentially my subjects and art making are based on improvisation.

Since the mid-1970s I have painted simplified torsos in various gestures, often animated by twisting the shoulders in an opposite direction to the hips, either forward and back, or up and down. This created implied movement, gesture and attitude uncomplicated by facial expressions and limbs. Then I added objects and fruit being held, balanced, treasured. Torsos playing games. Although I often call them Marquette's on a sculptor's shelf. Implied movement and gesture underlie each composition while spaces and shapes create tension and compression.



Enjoying drawing, painting, sculpture, ceramics and photography have provided me with more satisfaction and stimulation than I could ever have imagined.

Inspired by classical architecture and sculpture I turned the torsos, male and female, into sculptural columns - telamones(male), caryatids(female).

Introducing some lifting, wrestling and games. The "Moon Trap" series shows figures balancing tomato stakes to trap the nocturnal moon, still having fun in a fruitless season.

To me the human form is infinite in size and shape and infinitely sensuous. Rather than focus on catwalk forms I developed more weight in the legs and strength in backs and shoulders to create more realistic and heavier torsos.

Compositions are improvised through phases of change, overpainting, refining and reduction. Often, I don't know where I am going but the guiding thought is to combine figures, landscape, interiors and objects into meditative arrangements through my meditative process - mostly in quiet motion, sometimes dramatic.

Greg Frawley studied at the Alexander Mackie Teachers College and National Art School in Sydney before becoming a painter and teacher. As you can see, Greg has exhibited extensively in and around Sydney since 1979 and has won numerous art awards.
